Cat and Mouse...

Is a playful way to illustrate a certain type of power struggle. This game of constant pursuit, capture, and escape is a trope of fables, fiction, movies, and cartoons. Will one win over the other, or are the combatants locked in a never-ending game where the upper hand is gained, but eventually lost?

After her enemies forced her to abdicate her throne on July 24, 1567, leading to unsuccessful attempt to regain the throne, Queen Mary of Scotland fled to England, seeking the protection of her cousin, Elizabeth I. Perceiving Mary as a threat, Elizabeth confined her in various castles and manor houses in the interior of England.

Queen Mary was a skilled needlewoman and sewed many embroideries while she was under house arrest in England. An important means of expression for Mary, her amazing collection of embroideries featured fantastical beasts, Latin sayings, and hidden meanings...

One embroidery in particular, Mary's embroidery of a cat, is imbued with hidden meaning. The cat depicted has red fur, a nod to Elizabeth I's red, Tudor hair. The cat has its paw on the tail of a mouse, stopping it escaping. Is this a reference to the power struggle between these two female monarchs, or to Mary's imprisonment, where the meek mouse, though under the cat's foot, is bound to escape?

The Decatur Arts Alliance invites artists working in all media to submit work that explores the meaning of the game of "Cat and Mouse" in all its aspects: historical, political, and moral. Like the embroidery of the imprisoned Queen of Scotland, hidden meanings, games, and feints are encouraged in all works...

Artist Statement




Just Keep Going by Tara Coyt, Atlanta, GA




This Month's It Girl by Jala Ealey, Decatur, GA

Artist Statement

Artist Statement

"Modern Day Moses" is a subtle representation of humanity's struggle between materialism and spirituality. On one side we see a man riding a bicycle and carrying a board with the Ten Commandments written on it. Going in the opposite direction, we see a shiny luxury car. The photograph conveys the conflict between the different journeys humans can follow. Do we take the road laid out by society's emphasis on material wealth and status? Or, do we choose a path that values personal growth and personal relations?

The image also illustrates how difficult it is to reconcile these two paths. Materialism's mundane goal of material accumulation is in constant conflict with spirituality's search for meaning beyond our everyday existence. It is a battle that rages within each person, even when we do not notice.

Artist Statement

"Walking By" depicts the frictions between disparate socio-economic groups. Homeless people are often seen as being outside the social body. However, homelessness is a fact of our society. Local governments are constantly trying to remove the unhoused from downtown areas, business, commercial and tourist districts. City dwellers are equally keen on their removal or just turn a blind eye to their situation.

But as shown in the photograph, the homeless can sometimes offer passive resistance. Through a seemingly small act, the man on the sidewalk defies people's indifference and claims possession of the space he inhabits. He forces an acknowledgement of his existence, of his place in the urban environment, even if for a brief moment before passersby continue with their lives and only remember him as a nuisance.



Heritage

Artist Statement

"Heritage" is a contemporary couple's celebration of their African culture and roots. The piece features textured hairstyles, tribal clothing, and is surrounded by a frame made from modified male and female African statues. Their elongated faces are Atlanta road maps with one side dyed dark and one side light showing an element of cubism. Their noses are painted wooden kitchen spoons.



Vessel of Resistance by Carol Harvey, Decatur, GA

Artist Statement

"Vessel of Resistance" is a three-part ceramic sculpture that delves into the complex games of cat and mouse, exploring themes of power, resistance, and the fight for women's rights. The piece is an allegory for the struggle between those who seek to control and those who resist.

First Piece: The Predator

The 1st piece of the sculpture is a scowling, smug cat, its teeth clenched around a uterus. It embodies the oppressive forces that seek to control women's bodies.

Second Piece: The Shipwrecked Vessel

Behind the cat lies a shipwrecked boat, its hull cracked and battered, yet miraculously afloat. A crew of mice valiantly protects and carries a variety of female reproductive medical devices and drugs.

Third Piece: The Dinghy of Liberation

A small, weathered dinghy trails behind the main vessel, carrying a single mouse that is tasked with shepherding the drug combination used for medical abortions.



Split by Myth, Bound by Blood by AnnMarie Jalmasco, Atlanta, GA

Artist Statement

"Split by Myth, Bound by Blood" captures the intense struggle between two mythical beasts—representing the East and West. A fiery red dragon, symbolizing Asia, coils around a deep blue unicorn, an emblem of Europe, in a dramatic clash. While the dragon seems dominant at first, the historically peaceful unicorn shifts the balance, piercing the swirling beast. From the stab wound caused by the unicorn's horn, golden blood pours to the earth, symbolizing both the sacred and extreme nature of the encounter. This reversal reflects the artist's personal journey as a mixed-race creative, balancing Asian and Scandinavian identities, and confronting their previous rejection of the Asian half of their heritage. Inspired by medieval artistic traditions, the piece uses gold leaf to emphasize the mythical and other worldly tension between opposing forces, where conflict transforms into understanding through an inevitable, playful, yet gravitational encounter.



Expectations

Artist Statement

The parlay of this painting, "Expectations", is created by the juxtaposition of the atmosphere of the immediate subject and the discovery of a secondary image that confounds the initial view. The subject appears to be a happy occasion, one of celebration, given the numerous lit candles, the formal table setting for two, and the reference to wine. The second reading finds a dark figure peering in from outside: is this a guest or a party crasher? In assessing the elements of the composition, the viewer may wonder why there are three chairs, two settings, but two of the chairs are on the opposite side, and only one setting has a chair. Deciphering why the silhouetted figure is outside, and why two people as represented by chairs are not present becomes the cat and mouse gambit. Have the celebrants left hastily, have they not arrived, what is the intent of the figure outside?

Artist Statement

Inspired by the artist's love for improvisational community singing, Language Barrier is an imaginary chorus of characters caught in a silent, yet boisterous song. In some way or another, each character is trying to express itself, while simultaneously the set is mirroring. One "letter" is trying to eat its neighbor, who is floating carelessly with ambivalence, sometimes bumping into the rooted, heavy and unwavering character on the other side. They are a community of anthropomorphic nods to what it feels like to be in language.

Each "letter" was created improvisationally, with the artist present and in the moment, communicating with non-specific graphic shapes, pigment and paper. The artist has a simultaneous body of work that is based in realism. For the artist, communicating with the art process as an abstraction is in itself a disorienting dialect, a Language Barrier.

Artist Statement

It's Christmas Eve and the Grinch is back to his old tricks. Emerging from the shadows under the tree, he pulls back the lid on the cookie jar and reaches with his big, furry hand. A few clever gingerbread men scatter for cover, their impish smiles revealing amusement in this dangerous game. They seem confident in their deception, even as the red cloth that shelters them twists into a sinister grin.

Despite the playful theme, this painting posed many challenges. First, the composition needed to draw the viewer in, then keep their eyes moving across the picture as they discover the story being told. Next was to balance the colors, shapes and weights of the elements. The red cloth required glazing, a technique requiring much experimentation to achieve the desired "glow". Finally, there was the task of realistically rendering so many different textures: porcelain, fur, glass, wood, pine needles and crispy cookies. It was a tremendous amount of fun to paint!

I work with plaster and oil to create a surface that recalls cave drawings or petroglyphs. This allows the image to be perceived as from the present and the past.





Artist Statement

The king, a symbol of order and authority, faces the joker—the embodiment of chaos, wit, and unpredictability. But who truly holds the power? The joker may seem like a fool, yet he possesses the key, hinting at a hidden advantage in this strategic dance. This work reflects the 'cat and mouse' dynamic, where dominance is fluid, and the true winner is never obvious until the final move is made.

Artist Statement

"Mr. Fox Focus" (2021) is an etching with hand-coloring that plays with the classic dynamic of predator and prey. The fox, a master of deception, takes center stage in a surreal performance, where he is both the cunning trickster and the watchful hunter. But is he only a predator, or does the scene suggest a more complex game—one where roles blur, and the hunter and the hunted may not be so different? The interplay of power, illusion, and strategy mirrors the timeless 'cat and mouse' chase, where every move is part of a greater performance.




Underwater 2 by Vanessa Snyder, Peachtree City, GA

Inspired by Artemisia Gentlieschi's 'Susanna and the Elders' this piece examines the roles of men and women by drawing a parallel to a predator/prey dynamic. The stag stands in for the female figure as a symbol of the ways in which women are hunted while the wolves symbolize the violence of masculinity. The original painting tells the story of Susanna, a virtuous woman who was spied upon by lecherous elders while she was bathing. The men approached her and threatened her with ruination if she did not give in and lie with them. This piece works with and amplifies elements of the original painting, such as the figure's state of undress as a symbol of vulnerability. By utilizing the imagery of deer and wolves the state of fear and the inherent power struggle between Susanna and the Elders is amplified. In this work Susanna is literally fighting off the wolves who wish to devour her. This is a portrayal of the fear that every woman experiences while walking home alone in the dark.


